Safer Internet Day: One third of young people targeted with 'mean' online behaviour

Day of online activity aims to raise awareness of cyberbullying, but also stresses the positive, supportive aspects of children's online lives.

Nearly a third of British 11-16 year-olds say they have been targeted by mean or cruel behaviour online in the last year, but nearly two-thirds say they feel able to cope with online negativity, according to a survey commissioned by the UK Safer Internet Centre.

Its report, based on interviews with more than 1,000 young people, was released as part of the charity's Safer Internet Day 2015 event, which has backing from politicians, celebrities and internet companies.

The survey found plenty of positives around young people's online activities, with 63% saying they are closer to their friends because of the internet, and 55% seeing kind, positive and supportive posts all or most of the time on social networks and messaging apps.

However, the report also notes that 13% of 11-16 year-olds feel that people post negative, mean, critical or upsetting things all or most of the time on these services, while one in 20 said they feel that people are mean to them "most of the time" online.

"The report shows how important technology is in young people's lives and their friendships: for the majority of them, the internet is a positive place. But there is still that issue of young people that don't have such a good time," Will Gardner, chief executive of Childnet International and director of the UK Safer Internet Centre, told the Guardian.

"We don't want to trivialise the fact that many young people are having a difficult time online. We want to use this Safer Internet Day event to inspire young people to create a kinder internet for themselves, as well as showing parents that internet safety is an important issue to be looking at."

The report suggests that many children are taking action on these services when they encounter negativity. Of those who have experienced mean behaviour, 75% have blocked another user; 68% have supported someone who was being targeted, and 74% have stood up to a culprit.

Gardner, who sits on Facebook's safety advisory board, said that internet services have made encouraging steps forward in recent years to help their users – young people included – take action.

"The different services now have safety centres where you can get advice on how to keep safe, and there have been some improvements to the reporting and blocking tools available on those services," he said.

"Facebook reporting wasn't transparent in the past: when you made a report, you didn't know what happened to it. Now it has a dashboard where you can track that report, see if it's been dealt with or not, and what the outcome was. It's really important that these service providers maintain their users' confidence in the safety tools that are there."

Adults are also a key target for the day-long event, with online resources for parents and carers including a factsheet and "conversation starters", and education packs for teachers of primary and secondary-school age children.

"Our goal is to try to get a dialogue between parents and children about technology. Just as you'd ask your child what they did today, so you can take an interest in their online lives and the services that they're using," said Gardner.

"If there is a dialogue going on, it's more likely that young people will come and talk to their parent if something goes wrong."

Chocolate production, the facts about organic chocolate, fair trade chocolate and more

Buying chocolate should be an informed decision. There are many factors to consider about chocolate production and where your chocolate comes from.

Many chocolate lovers consume and enjoy chocolate without ever thinking about 0 or how it was produced. However, there are many issues surrounding the production of chocolate that are important for consumers to be aware of, from the labor used to harvest the cacao 15. Here's a look at some of the issues surrounding chocolate production and what you can do to ensure you're buying chocolate with a trouble-free history.

Chocolate Labor Practices & Politics

Cocoa beans are harvested mainly in developing countries 16, to say the least. The Ivory Coast produces 30 to 40 percent of the world's cacao, and is still one of the worst offenders when it comes to labor practices. Despite the Cocoa Protocol, established in 2001 as an audit system for African governments to help monitor child labor, the country's civil wars and disputed elections have made it difficult to track the worst offenders. Large chocolate manufacturers 17 earlier this year for using cacao from Ivory Coast farms that may employ child labor.

Organic & Raw Chocolate

Cocoa trees are highly susceptible to disease and pests, so the use of pesticides is widespread. Organic chocolate means the chocolate is 18. Luckily, organic chocolate is becoming easier to find locally, with Whole Foods and Trader Joe's both carrying USDA-

certified organic chocolate. Raw organic chocolate, while much less sweet than the non-raw kind, is gaining in popularity 19. One of the benefits of buying raw is that the cacao is heated at very low temperatures, using only a very small amount of energy compared to non-raw chocolate production.

Fair Trade Chocolate

The number one way you can be sure your chocolate has been harvested sustainably and without the use of slave or child labor, is 20. This concept began in the 1940s as a way to help poor communities sell their products to more well-off ones. It has since evolved into an organization that partners with companies that provide workers in developing countries a living wage, are anti-slave and anti-child labor, and that use sustainable environmental practices. Fair Trade USA provides a list of certified chocolate companies to help you make informed buying decisions.

Single-Origin Chocolate

Where your chocolate comes from is important, 21. How can you tell where it comes from? Besides looking for a Fair Trade label, seek out single-origin chocolate. Single-origin chocolate comes from a single region or farm and is labeled as such. By purchasing this type of chocolate, 22 from a country with strict environmental regulations and laws against child and slave labor.

Why are four-leaf clovers lucky?

One day in 2014 in Rochester, New York, a woman named Sandra rode her bike into town to do some shopping. She locked up her steed, shopped and came back to find it gone.

Devastated, she 0 the loss to the cops, who warned her the chances of recovery were slim.

Later that day, at a coffee shop, she spotted another policeman and 23 to tell her sad tale again. Promising to have a look, the cop hopped on his bike and went off on patrol, but not before Sandra 24 him a four-leaf clover to boost his chances. Within minutes, the officer had found her wheels. Never, he reported, had he recovered a missing item so quickly. The clover had apparently done its work.

Nearly as interesting as the happy outcome of this story is the fact that Sandra had a spare four-leaf clover on hand. It was no accident — she 25 them. In fact, she had so many she made a habit of giving them away. In this, she's not as unusual as you might think: The Guinness World Record for the largest collection of four-leaf clovers goes to one Edward Martin of Cooper Landing, Alaska, who has amassed more than 100,000 of them. That's truly astounding when you consider the fact that your chances of finding a four-leaf clover are one in 10,000!

Everybody knows that four-leaf clovers are supposed to bring good luck, but just what is it that makes them so lucky?

As is often the case, it all 26 back to Eve. Legend has it that as she and Adam were being hustled out of the Garden of Eden, she plucked a four-leaf clover to carry with her as a souvenir of Paradise.

The druids of the ancient Celtic world wouldn't have known Eve from Adam, as it were, but they too were big fans of four-leaf clovers and 27 them to ward off evil spirits.

With the little green plants enjoying such popularity, it's no wonder St. Patrick decided to use them as a teaching tool when he set about converting Ireland to Christianity. The four-leaf variety being in short supply, he settled on the ubiquitous three-leaf clovers to explain the three-in-one nature of the Holy Trinity to the heathens. One leaf 28 for the Father, one for the Son and the third for the Holy Spirit, all united on the single stem of the Godhead.

Similarly, a poem in the popular tradition holds that the four leaves on the lucky clover signify fame, wealth, health and faithful love. Along these lines, the English have a tradition that if you 29 of clover, you're guaranteed a happy and prosperous marriage.

So we've established that four-leaf clovers have been considered powerfully lucky for a very long time, but why?

There are 300 species of clover, but the best one for the soil is known as white clover, or Trifolium repens. It happens to be the kind of clover that produces the lucky four-leaf aberration. That fourth leaf, it turns out, is the result of a suppressed gene that fails to be suppressed. Nobody's exactly sure what causes this to happen; but, for whatever reason, it rarely does. Very rarely. As mentioned earlier, your chances of finding a four-leaf clover are a measly one in 10,000. It's that rarity that accounts for the luck associated with four-leaf clovers. In other words, you're lucky just to find one, so it stands to reason that more luck 30.
